

FAMILY MEDICINE CARES

Improving Health Care Access with Your Help

It's a basic human right: Everyone deserves to be cared for, to have their health care needs met. And it's a belief held strongly by the AAFP Foundation and why the **Family Medicine Cares** program exists.

Since its launch in 2011, the **Family Medicine Cares USA** (FMC USA) has awarded grants to **94 free clinics in 32 states and one U.S. territory**, with more than 20 student-run clinics, totaling **\$1,728,697**. These clinics offer services at no charge to patients who would otherwise not have access to affordable primary care.

In 2021, funding for FMC USA was increased from \$75,000 to \$150,000, and 15 clinics received funding.

The grants provide up to \$25,000 to new free health clinics and up to \$10,000 to existing free health clinics for durable medical instruments and equipment.

Clinics with a Community Need Index (CNI) of 3.5 or greater are given preference. The CNI aggregates five socioeconomics indicators known to contribute to health disparity—income, culture/language, education, housing status, and insurance coverage, and applies them to every ZIP code in the United States. Residents of communities with the highest CNI scores were shown to be twice as likely to experience preventable hospitalizations for manageable conditions (e.g., ear infections, pneumonia, or congestive heart failure) as communities with the lowest CNI scores.

RESIDENT SERVICE AWARDS

Family Medicine Residents Serving the Underserved

As an extension of the Family Medicine Cares program, the **Resident Service Awards** provide the opportunity for family medicine residents to pursue a project that gives back to the community they are working in as well as the chance to gain additional clinical skills and work with practicing physician mentors.

To date, the Family Medicine Cares Resident Service Award (FMC RSA) program has awarded a total of \$247,500 to 25 first- or second-year residents.

Annually, it gives two \$16,500 awards to support 12-month service projects implemented by a first- or second-year resident that addresses an unmet health care need in their community. The awardees will present their projects at the 2022 National Conference of Family Medicine Residents and Medical Students.






Creating the Next Generation of Leaders

Building on the education and clinical work medical students and residents receive are opportunities such as the **Family Medicine Leads** program. It extends the learning into developing leadership skills and networking with mentors and practicing family physicians—a vital part of building future leaders.

In 2021, **Family Medicine Leads** awarded scholarships for the National Conference of Family Medicine Residents and Medical Students—even more than usual since the conference was virtual—and conducted the Emerging Leader Institute (ELI) virtually.

- 364 scholarships were awarded for National Conference
- 13 residents and 17 medical students participated in ELI

The 2021 class of scholars for the ELI were divided into three leadership tracks: Policy and Public Health, Personal and Practice, and Philanthropic and Mission-Driven.



FAMILY MEDICINE DISCOVERS

Creating a Real-world Model for Primary Care Research

The goal of the **Family Medicine Discovers** program is to fund practicing family physicians to generate new evidence and innovative research models for "what works" in real-world primary care settings.

Starting in 2019, Family Medicine Discovers launched Family Medicine Discovers Rapid Cycle Scientific Discovery and Innovation (FMD RapSDI). FMD RapSDI is a collaboration between the AAFP Foundation and the AAFP National Research Network (AAFP NRN).



 Iman Majd, MD, LAc, a physician, licensed acupuncturist, and faculty member at the University of Washington School of Medicine, is examining the feasibility of implementing and evaluating ear acupuncture for chronic pain management in a group setting, a step that could reduce patients' lengthy wait for an appointment.

The application process for the next round begins in July 2022.



Connecting with Chapters to Fuel Service-oriented Projects

The **Family Medicine Philanthropic Consortium (FMPC)** is a collaborative program of the AAFP Foundation and 55 AAFP Constituent Chapters/Foundations. Since 2006, the FMPC Grant Awards program has provided \$1,164,170 to support 347 projects from AAFP Constituent Chapter/Chapter Foundations in 38 states and the District of Columbia.

Here's what happened in 2021:

- The 2021 FMPC Grant Awards awarded \$35,750 to 21 Constituent Chapter/ Chapter Foundation projects.
- The FMPC Chapter Engagement Project provides each AAFP Chapter or Chapter Foundation with \$750 to showcase a chapter program/activity that connects with one of the three designated focus areas of the FMPC: Student/Resident, Member Outreach and Public Health. In 2021, 17 Chapter and/or Chapter Foundations applied for funding for a total of \$12,750.

Established in 1992, the Student Externship
Matching Grant Awards program provides
matching grants that are a dollar-for-dollar
match of \$1,250 between the Foundation
and the sponsoring Chapter/Chapter
Foundation. Since its inception, the
Student Externship Matching Grants
program has provided \$1,171,750 in matching
grants to support 959 student externships.
In 2021, the AAFP Foundation awarded a total
of 23 matching grants to Chapters from 11 states.

Acting as the scribe for the specialty, the **Center for the History of Family Medicine (CHFM)** is dedicated to serving as the collective memory as well as informing the future.

To that end, this past year the Center has:

- Held the first annual CHFM Student and Resident Essay Contest to encourage future physicians to engage with the specialty's history as well as use the lessons learned to improve future health care. The winners were: Morgan Weiler (first place) and Auguste Niybiziz, DO (second place).
- Created a Soundcloud account to make it easy to access all of the Center's digitized oral histories, including stories about COVID-19 and one-on-one chats with family physician leaders.
- Hosted a Town Hall with the AAFP to view and discuss the documentary, "Power to Heal," which looks back at the challenging implementation of a new program, Medicare, in the 1960s. Under the guidance of President Lyndon B. Johnson, the federal government used Medicare payments as the incentive to virtually end segregation in hospitals throughout the South and the entire country.

In addition, the Center benefited from 329 hours of volunteer time this past year. The support CHFM received in 2021 and continues to receive helps preserve this repository and also allow it to be a dynamic resource for future family physicians, academics, and researchers.

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Each year we receive heartfelt gifts in memory of loved ones and in honor of family, colleagues, friends, or special occasions.

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


